The Ready. Set. Record. Film Festival took place on February 20th at the Ron Robinson Theater in downtown Little Rock as students showcased their creativity and talent through videos on the big screen.

Each year, students around the state can enter the film festival by creating a 30 second PSA video about the harmful effects of tobacco and nicotine. Students are awarded in several categories including best editing, best special effects and best actor/actress.

A total of 152 videos were submitted by 405 students. Several of those went on to become finalists that were then awarded at the film festival. The event was hosted by the University of Arkansas cheer coach and tobacco prevention activist, Shawn Burns.

Thank you to all of the volunteers who helped, we couldn't have done it without you! To the students who submitted videos, the work you are doing to prevent youth tobacco use is not going unnoticed. Thank you for participating!

- 3. Cadmium is found in batteries AND cigarette smoke.






















PPYC Chapter Highlights
